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INTRODUCTION

The VAWDASV Research Network Wales was initiated in Spring 2021 by the University of South Wales and launched on 25th November 2021 by the Minister for Social Justice, Jane Hutt MS, on the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women.

Aim

The VAWDASV Research Network aim is to facilitate *‘an inclusive research community for Wales that provides a safe, open forum to bring together those who are working towards an end to VAWDASV to set the future research agenda, foster collaboration and develop grant applications, undertake high quality research, and work towards the elimination of VAWDASV’.*

Objectives

-  Determine/understand the research and practice priorities for Wales.
-  Identify gaps in VAWDASV research.
-  Share knowledge and expertise (including knowledge exchange).
-  ‘Test’ research ideas and gauge interest in collaboration.
-  Identify and respond to research council grant and commercial grant calls.
-  Co-produce research grant applications.
-  Develop future partnership working across the UK and internationally.
-  Annually report on progress against objectives.

The VAWDASV research network is governed by a core group which meets bi-monthly, with quarterly meetings held with wider network members, and quarterly newsletters: [March 2022](#), [July 2022](#), [November 2022](#). The VAWDASV Research Network published two reports in 2022 – the first was in partnership with the WG VAWDASV team and focussed on [VAWDASV Survivor Engagement Wales](#), and the second was an online consensus study to examine and co-produce the VAWDASV research priorities Wales: [VAWDASV: Setting Research Priorities for Wales](#).

At the time of writing, there are over 100 members representing organisations across health, social care, government, local authority, education, the third sector, policing and justice, and academia in Wales. We also have a growing membership representing organisations in England.

Aim of this report


The following is the VAWDASV Research Network's first annual report for the period November 2021 – November 2022. It uses findings from a short online survey conducted with its members between 18th October 2022 and 21st November 2022 to report the impact of the research network since its inception.

FINDINGS

Thirty-two survey responses were received from sixty-nine members at that time (46% response rate). The survey included eight questions, which comprised a mixture of multiple choice and open text response. Any identifying information from responses has been omitted for anonymity.

Q1. Do you wish to continue your membership of the VAWDASV Research Network Wales?

All respondents (100%) confirmed they wished to continue their membership.



Q2. Would you like to be part of the core group (meeting every other month with additional working groups as and when required) or part of the wider membership (meeting every quarter plus occasional networking or project collaborations and events)?



Q3. Thinking about your experience of the VAWDASV Research Network Wales, what has worked well?

Twenty-two responses were received to this open text question and a selection of responses are presented below¹.

Meetings, information sharing, events, research priorities.

The meetings have provided an inclusive space and an opportunity to stay connected with the VAWDASV sector in Wales (meetings are well coordinated). Work-streams have been well prioritised in this first year. The launch was a successful in-person event!

Opportunities to hear about the work being done and to connect with third/public sector partners as an academic.

Q4. Thinking about your experience of the VAWDASV Research Network Wales, what could be done better?

Fifteen responses were received to this open text question and a selection of responses are presented below.

We could pull together a little more - it's a lot of work for two people to manage and I still don't know all the group, and the times of day we meet is sometimes not an option to attend.

Personally, I would like to be able to give more time to supporting areas of work.

I would like to know more about how to collaborate with researchers and about opportunities for research funding.

More time to develop joint research in this field of study to support practice.

More presentations/awareness raising sessions on the work of different organisations/teams.

Q5. Please state the top three things that the network has helped you achieve or ways it has made a difference.

Twenty-two responses were received to this open text question and a selection of responses are presented below.

Getting the survivor voice out there and the importance.

Informed me of the Violence Prevention Unit - I have used the resources from their work and signposted to their work in my teaching.

Further understanding of what people see as the key priorities for the VAWDASV sector.

I feel like I'm contributing to the direction of travel in Wales.

Q6. In the last 12 months, have you developed any new collaborations as a result of the network?




From seven 'yes' responses to questions 6, five members provided additional information:

Working more closely with NSPCC



Q7. In the last 12 months, have you submitted any funding bids, successful or unsuccessful, directly related to the network?



Two members advised of research proposals submitted to the Doctoral Training Partnership, and NIHR. In addition, a research grant application was submitted to Health and Care Research Wales. All submissions were unsuccessful.

Q9. Is there anything else that you would like to tell us about the network or the impact it has had for you?

Eight responses were received to question 9, including one 'N/A' and a second confirming their renewal:

SUMMARY

In its first year the network has brought together over 100 practitioners and academics with an interest in VAWDASV through meetings, events, newsletters, and information sharing.

This has resulted in:

- 🌱 4 research funding bids;
- 🌱 Contribution to new curriculum content;
- 🌱 Increased understanding of VAWDASV;
- 🌱 Increased understanding of interdisciplinary approaches;
- 🌱 Increased collaboration between academia and practice; and
- 🌱 Increased cooperation within the sector.

In the coming year, continuing our progress towards our aim and objectives, we will capitalise on this work to:

- 🌱 Host in person networking events;
- 🌱 Increase the membership to include more representation from associated sectors such as criminal justice and health and social care;
- 🌱 Submit further funding bids and secure funding for at least one collaborative research project;
- 🌱 Have a demonstrable impact on policy and practice in the sector; and
- 🌱 Expand the membership across the UK.

APPENDIX 1

Open text responses by question

Thinking about your experience of the VAWDASV Research Network Wales, what has worked well?
